"In my 2nd grade class my first lesson was Introducing the food groups and having students name examples of foods from each group. While were discussing the fruit group, one student said that she did not like Asparagus. I encouraged the class to try new foods in different ways, like roasting/baking vegetables. When I came back to class for my second lesson, she shared with me that her mom looked up a recipe for baked asparagus, her whole family tried it, and she said it was very tasty and would be eating this recipe again."

"On a recent visit to the Senior Center, I had a senior citizen come to my table asking for simple, healthy recipes that would be easy to cook. I used a food hero recipe that was a one-pan meal with a total cook time of 20 minutes. The next time I went back to the Senior Center this gentleman said he has been cooking the meal once a week and has enjoyed eating a healthy recipe, that was easy for him to make at home."

Missouri Voices Survey

In early 2024, as part of a Community Health Needs Assessment, all Community Health Specialists conducted a "MO Voices Survey" to gain the thoughts of community members about the health of their communities. Some key findings are listed below.

Please note, these results include people who live and/or work in any of the 7 counties I cover (Douglas, Howell, Ozark, Taney, Texas, Webster, & Wright).

- "I trust my healthcare providers." → 46.4% Somewhat agree,
 35% Strongly Agree, 14.2% Disagree
- "I have access to medicines I need." \rightarrow 54.1% Strongly Agree, 30.1% Somewhat Agree, 7.7% Disagree
- "I regularly feel anxious, stressed, or hopeless." \rightarrow 29.5% Agree, 48.7% Disagree, 21.9% Neither
- "I wish we had ___ in my community." → Mental Health Care & Resources, More Medical Professionals, Transportation,
 Community Centers / Resources, Access to Healthy Food, & Emergency Healthcare Services (ER & Urgent Care)
- Biggest Concern for Health & Well-Being \rightarrow Financial, Access to Healthcare, & Mental Health
- Top 4 Most Pressing Health Concerns for the Community → Substance Use Disorder (SUD), Mental Health, Unhealthy Eating/Overweight/Obesity/ Diabetes, and Poor Access to Healthcare

Cooking Matters

Make quick, tasty, and affordable meals everyone will enjoy.

This Cooking Matters was two six-session series of classes in Ozark County serving 22 student participants through partnership with Dora R-III School District. This class is taught twice a day to the students in the Dora FACS nutrition and health classes.

Annual diet-related cardiometabolic disease costs are \$300 per person. By improving the diet of those participating in Cooking Matters courses, there is potential to save \$300 per person per year. 17 participants completed the course in Ozark County in 2024 for an economic healthcare impact of \$5.100.

Of the participants surveyed 82% increased fruit and vegetables, 65% increased healthy foods when eating out, and 82% cooked more at home. 76% of participants reported they will teach friends and family what they learned in this class.

Local Impact

The Ozark County Senior Demonstration program is an AmeriCorps grant received to engage community seniors to serve as volunteers throughout the county in a series of projects to provide policy, systems, and environmental changes to promote healthy choices for the community. Focusing on Healthy Futures and Education, the grant projects include building community gardens, implementing 4-H and STEM programs, and a Senior Tech program. At the end of the two-year grant, the volunteers will be responsible for decreasing food insecurity, providing healthy foods to the community, improving youth engagement and social skills, increasing opportunity for learning through multi-generation activities, and reducing the negative impact of isolation imposed on the county senior population by the pandemic through engaging fellow seniors in healthy, motivating activities and programs. The AmeriCorps federal annual investment of \$75,000, supplemented by \$7,500 in match through university employee volunteer recruitment, volunteer management, evidence-based programming, and program promotion, was awarded in October 2021. The two-year \$150,000 grant program is a multidisciplinary endeavor by Alicia Amyx-Winrod, Nutrition and Health Educator, Katy Taylor, 4-H Specialist, and Nick Sanchez, Youth Program Associate. Through partnerships with more than fifteen local service agencies, community organizations, and local businesses, this program has insured sustainability and community support.

The Missouri Council for Activity and Nutrition (MOCAN) is a partner-driven council that is housed in Columbia with MU Extension and is composed of professionals across the state from diverse backgrounds (e.g., educators, government officials, healthcare providers, nonprofit representatives, etc.). Through statewide networking, organizations work together to implement and support policy changes that will improve the health and quality of life of Missourians.





100 Miles, 100 Days statewide initiative by MU Extension, is a free program igniting physical activity over summer. 807 Missourians joined this program including Ozark County residents. This program encourage participants to increase or maintain their physical activity throughout the summer through education, competition, and goals.

As a continuation of the stem programs to decrease food insecurity and provide healthy foods to the community, I utilize **the Eating from the Garden** curriculum and university garden resources to provide direct education in the **Gainesville Elementary garden**. The redesign of the gardens have led to more access for larger numbers of students to "get their hands in the dirt". This series started in October 2024 with class time sessions and physical gardening sessions and will continue in the spring with addition sessions to plant, harvest, taste, and share our garden produce. Through this PSE direct education project, I have:

- Continued and enhanced existing partnerships with schoolteachers, administrators, and students
 Provided direct education and garden education to students
- Designed and presented tastings appropriate to our gardening region and student interest
- Manually helped students clean the garden beds and "put the gardens" to bed for the season Scheduled additional sessions for direct education and physical planting for the 2025 season


